Key Vocabulary

Country: a nation with its own government, occupying a particular territory.

County: a territorial division of some countries, forming the chief unit of local administration.

City: large town with a high population, conferred by the queen!

Town: a built-up area with a name, defined boundaries, and local government, that is larger than a village and generally smaller than a city.

Location: a particular place or position.

Region: an area or part of a country or the world having definable characteristics but not always fixed boundaries.

Land use: describes the function of the land e.g. farming, housing, forestry etc.

Urban: a built up area of either a town or city.

Rural: an area of countryside or farmland.

Greenbelt: rural land surrounding a town or city which cannot be built upon.

Equator: An imaginary line, with a latitude of 0, which splits the globe into the northern and southern hemisphere.

Latitude: is how far <u>north or south</u> a place is. These lines run parallel to the Equator.


Longitude: is how far <u>east or west</u> a place is. These lines run from the top of the Earth to the bottom.

Northern hemisphere: the half of the earth that lies north of the equator.

Southern hemisphere: the half of the earth that lies below the equator.
