



Phonic activities / games

Dot / dash game:

Adult writes word and child adds either a dash or a dot underneath. Remember a dot is for each single sound of a word and a dash is for each digraph, for example

sleep fish cat lamp

Charlie Chaplin:

Choose a word from the wordlist-and draw the correct number of spaces, eg "pig" will need 3 spaces for each letter _____. If the word is "teacher" you will need 4 spaces t ea ch er one short space for the single sound t and longer spaces for the other units of sounds. Likewise "shell" would be sh e II.

Ask your child to guess a letter in your word. If it contains that letter, fill in the space. If it doesn't, write the wrong guess down on a separate piece of paper and begin to draw a Charlie Chaplin! For each letter your child gets wrong, you add a different part of the body, a head, an arm, leg etc. and finally a walking stick The idea is that if you complete Charlie Chaplin before the word is guessed you have won the game!
